

The Role of the Boat Captain

On bigger tours where there are several crews taking part, it may be a good idea to appoint a Captain for each boat. They should be familiar with British Rowing's RowSafe guidance, particularly the section on Touring Rowing.

The boat captain should stay with their designated boat throughout the tour. The rest of the crew may be moved around.

Responsibilities

The captain's primary responsibility is the safety of the crew.

Boat Captains are required to:

- ensure that their boat is in a safe condition at all times,
- If required, ensure that biosecurity measures have been taken
- determine the crew order.
- manage crew welfare during rowing by ensuring provision of water, suitable rest periods and checking for injuries,
- ensure whoever is coxing navigates the boat in accordance with the agreed instructions and with due regard to hazards and conditions,
- communicate with the tour organiser and/or safety adviser in the event of emergencies afloat.
- attend briefings daily or as circumstances dictate to receive guidance from the tour safety adviser on the itinerary, route, hazards and other safety matters.





Before going afloat

Ensure that:

- You have read all safety instructions and information:
 - The Tour Risk Assessment/Safety Plan,
 - British Rowing safety guidance for touring.
- Your boat and blades are sound with no damage or loose fittings
- You have all required other equipment, particularly a boat hook and paddle, at least two
 bailers or a hand operated bilge pump, suitable bow and stern lines and mooring spike
 and material to cushion the keel of the boat if positioned on hard ground.
- You have buoyancy aids for all crew members. Coxes must wear a buoyancy aid at all times.
- You have at least one fully charged mobile phone with waterproof container with number(s) registered with tour management.
- Your crew have no injuries or illnesses and are capable of rowing the stated distances.
- Your crew have suitable clothing for the forecast weather conditions, in particular that
 anyone who is due to cox has sufficient warm and weather-proof clothing in case of rain or
 cold weather.

You have the navigation maps for the day together with any other documentation issued by the organisers.
